 \mathcal{W} e are constantly being asked how many people visit the garden. It is difficult to give an answer to this question but we need to have some idea of numbers not only for our sponsors but also to try and estimate how we shall manage the garden in the coming years. Consequently, we plan to count people through the garden on a few days in the coming months.

The random dates will be: **Tuesday 15 May, Saturday 2 June; Sunday 15 July and Monday 27 August.** These include a day in the middle of the week, a potentially busy Saturday; a quiet Sunday and a Bank Holiday Monday. Can you help us with the counting? We shall arrange it so that a person sits by each gate with a hand-held 'clicker' counter. We hope that most people will be prepared to do an hour session so we'll need sixteen people for each of the days. It shouldn't be arduous and there's a good chance of a cup of tea to keep you going! Garden News

 \mathcal{H} ard work by the volunteers and the effects of benign spring weather have contributed to significant developments in the garden. The roses in the fragrant area have been planted and are growing strongly. Some of the roses and other climbers for the Pergola have arrived and are about to be planted. These plantings will ensure a profusion of colour and fragrance in two areas of the garden.

The apple trees to be pleached along the Ogee Arches have all been planted, fruit trees against the walls are being trained (espaliered or fanned), and it is with great delight that we have observed new growth sprouting from the ancient pear trees against the south-facing and westfacing walls. It is hoped that it will be possible to identify the variety of the pears.

Now that most of the structural planting is in place we shall be concentrating on getting the medicinal and dye plants established in the garden. The medicinal beds will be in the twelve, box-edged, central beds. Each of these beds has been designed to contain plants known (or believed) to have curative properties for certain parts of the body or conditions. For example, there will be separate beds containing plants for use in curing the kidneys or during childbirth.

We recently took delivery of some rather special slate signs for the twelve medicinal beds. The names on the signs (in both English and Welsh) were carved by Robert Kennedy, a sculptor working at Chapter Arts Centre in Cardiff. He carved them from a piece of slate which for many years was the side panel of a bath in Cardiff! They are not yet fixed into the ground: this work is due to be done in the very near future.

Sponsored trees have already been labelled in English, Latin & Welsh etc. We now have the Gravograph machine on loan from Dyffryn Gardens for making the permanent labels. Until these are produced (this work is being undertaken by a volunteer) temporary labels will inform visitors of the content of each bed.

The old Acer tree adjacent to the east wall of the garden, has been lightly pruned and its canopy shaped, and is now an aesthetically pleasing feature of the garden. This work was undertaken by Rhodri Jones of Sharp Edges who gave an informative talk to volunteers on the equipment he uses for tree surgery before he demonstrated his skills on the tree.

t the Physic Garden we are anxious to involve and interest children in the way in which plants that we use This evervdav are arown. summer we are asking children up to the age of 11 to grow things in the containers in which they are sold. For example, they might grow a broad bean in an



empty tin which used to contain broad3beans or basil in an old crisp bag which once contained basil-flavoured crisps. The possibilities are endless: the only rule will be that the growing plant should be identifiable by our team of judges and that the container must once have contained the plant which has been grown and must show either the name of the plant or a picture of it. Anyone born after 1st September 1996 should get scouring the shelves in the shops for ideas for containers and then get planting! Judging will take place on 27 August 2007. There will be prizes for the best plants and the most imaginative containers.
