Outstanding triumph of first official garden event

of June proved to be successful in all ways. It kicked off with the erection of a marquee on the lawn by local contractors, Four Seasons, who did a superbly efficient job on our behalf.

First event was a buffet and drinks for our volunteer team who worked so diligently to hone the garden into its finished state.

There followed two programmes arranged by Jean Reader, involving knowledgeable specialists on plants in the garden (see page 3).

Highlight of the weekend was the Saturday evening members' garden party, an event that drew some 160 people, including almost 40 quests. Thankfully the rain held off, providing the opportunity for people to take a leisurely stroll to examine the planted beds and the numerous furnishings while a quartet of brass



from the Cardiff Royal College played a selection of music appropriately chosen to represent the Georgian period, rounded off by some delightful music from the George Gershwin songbook. Our chairman, Dan Clayton-Jones, later received a number of appreciative calls from members and guests, one of whom described the event as "an outstanding triumph."

The programme was rounded off by a press event, which unfortunately clashed with a royal visit to Cardiff, but press folk who turned up included BBC Wales, HTV, the Glamorgan Gem, the South Wales Echo and Western Mail and others.











New benches for the garden

owbridge Physic Garden Trust has deployed the services of craftsman Tim Wade of Llandovery to manufacture specially-designed oak benches. Tim has already created the oak benches that adorn the garden's two summer houses and which have proved to be so popular with visitors.

He is now working on a bench for the proposed quadrant area, just inside the Church street entrance. This will form a convivial meeting



place for people visiting the garden – a zone in which to debate world affairs, have an idle chat, or maybe simply pass the time of day. Tim is working to complete a curved bench to fit the area which is likely to be delivered during August or September.

Woodcarver Tim is a graduate of the Queen Elizabeth Scholarship Trust (QEST), which was founded in 1990 to celebrate the 150th anniversary of the Royal Warrant Holders Association and the 90th birthday of the late HM Queen Elizabeth, The Queen Mother.

Among his other accomplishments, Tim recently completed a year-long project designing and building an oak-framed chapel, made for clients who run a Christian retreat near Carmarthen. It contains 20 seats and uses sustainable local materials. Tim explained, "It has wonderful views and is influenced by my travels around the world."

Volunteers

Over the first weekend of June the garden was a hive of industry. On Saturday 2 June volunteers counted everyone that came into the garden between 10am and 6pm: 563 people visited on that day. All weekend the marquee gave the garden a festival feel: there were visits from TV cameras and radio interviewers and two whole days were given over to medicinal plants and using plant to dye fabrics.

Lara Bernays presented a *Plants & Medicine* day which gave visitors an opportunity to consider the ways in which plants are used to cure illness. There was a workshop on what makes a plant therapeutic and opportunities to make both tinctures and ointment and, for children, an opportunity to make an herbal bath posy to take home. Throughout the day volunteers recorded memories of what our visitors remembered of plants which were used to cure illness in the past: the results of these memories have been sent to Kew Gardens to add to their database of remembered remedies.





Margaret and David Redpath gave a presentation of the ways in which plants are used to dye fabrics. They dyed wool using three of the most famous natural dyes to produce the three primary colours: red (from Madder), yellow (from Weld) and blue (from Indigo). Many members of the public had a go at dyeing yarn and took small hanks of wonderfully shaded wool home with them. The event also gave visitors an opportunity

to have a close look at the plants growing in the dye bed
