Much-coveted Green Pennant is awarded to the Physic Garden

Cowbridge Physic Garden now shares a unique distinction with the country's finest parks – after receiving a coveted Green Pennant Award from the environmental charity, Keep Britain Tidy.

Green Pennant Awards recognise and reward the best community run enterprises in the country, and Cowbridge Physic Garden stood out after impressing the judges with its excellence and presentation as a well-managed space, for its signage, and especially for the dedication of local volunteers who look after it.

This year is a milestone, as the number of Green Flag and Green Pennant Award winners has passed 1,000 for the first time.

Mr John Lloyd Jones, chair of the Countryside Council for Wales, presented the award to Mrs Jo Homfray, a garden trustee, at the Royal Welsh Show and it comes just over two years after the garden was first opened to the public.

Mrs Homfray She said later: "This is a considerable distinction for Cowbridge Physic Garden which is still in its infancy but maturing fast and drawing enormous appreciation from those visit it.

'The garden has developed superbly and is now looking at its very best. We're all delighted with it and especially proud of our dedicated volunteers, who do so much to maintain its presentational excellence.



Visit Wales boss bowled over by physic garden



The chairman of Visit Wales came to Cowbridge in August and declared the town's physic garden to be a "real gem in the Vale".

Jonathan Jones, who chairs the body that was formerly known as the Welsh Tourist Board, came along at the invitation of Mr Dan Clayton-Jones, and was highly impressed.

He said: "I have to admit that, although I have been in Cowbridge a number of times in the last year, I have not made the short detour to this garden. I am relieved to see that it now has a brown tourism sign pointing the way for visitors, but it clearly needs more publicity." He promised to see what Visit Wales could do in terms of promoting the physic garden to visitors. He added that the fact that such a fine attraction was designed and conceived by volunteers — and still is tended by volunteers — made it a real achievement for Cowbridge.

Mr Jones spent time talking to volunteers about the problems involved in tending the gardens — until heavy rain forced everyone indoors.

Apple Cissy or Tampling

A recent planting in the garden was an apple tree with an interesting local history.

The apple was raised by a cottager named Tampling who resided in Malpas near Newport 100 years ago. He distributed grafts to friends around the country. After his death his sister Cissy occupied the cottage and continued to distribute plants until her death, and thus it was known as 'Cissy's Apple', by which name it is still known.

Dame Jenny Abramsky gives Cowbridge Physic Garden the thumbs-up

Dame Jenny Abramsky, chairman of the UK's Heritage Memorial Fund met volunteers, trustees, helpers and members of Cowbridge Physic Garden in an hour-long visit today (Tuesday). She was shown round the half-acre site in Cowbridge town centre, now attracting more than 100,000 visitors annually, by the garden's chairman, Dan Clayton-Jones. Last year the garden was officially opened by HRH the Duchess of Cornwall, its patron.

Dame Jenny said, "This project is one of sheer delight and quite one of the best developments of its kind in Britain. The fact that it gives so much pleasure to so many people is the greatest tribute one can pay to those who developed and now run it.

"When one considers that just a few years ago this was a derelict site it gives real encouragement to so many others about the task of embracing creative schemes throughout the country. I congratulate everyone who has put so much effort into it," she added.

Initially developed at a cost of £350,000, half by grant and the remainder from matched funding, the garden is open free of charge 364 days per year.

Dame Jennifer, who joined the BBC in 1969 went on to become the first woman editor of the agenda-setting Today programme, subsequently joining the BBC's Executive Board with overall responsibility for Radios 1,2,3,4 and Five Live, plus many other elements of BBC broadcasting, running an annual programming budget of £236 millions.

Dan Clayton-Jones observed, "It's always a pleasure to show our garden to creative people and no one better fits that bill than Dame Jenny. Her role in running the UK National Heritage Memorial Fund is highly responsible and significant in developing landmark projects. We wish her well."
